

Pancreatic cancer (PC) is one of the deadliest of all types of cancer

Hard Facts about PC

- It's the 4th leading cause of cancer death in the US, and the most lethal. Overall survival rate is 6%
- More than 45,000 Americans will be diagnosed this year. More than 38,000 will die.
- Nearly 90% of PC patients are over 55. There's no early detection (yet). Less than 20% of those diagnosed are eligible for surgery.
- There's no cure (yet), unless the cancer is surgically removed in its earliest stages.
- There's too little federal funding. PC research constitutes less than 2% of the National Cancer Institute's budget.
- But there is hope: with Cablevision's support of The Lustgarten Foundation, 100% of all donations go directly to pancreatic cancer research.
